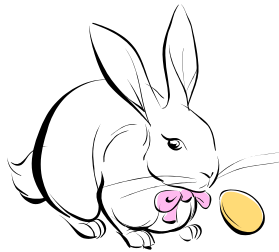

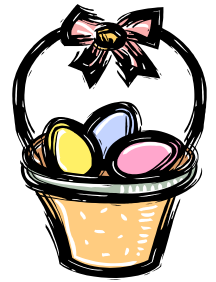

22nd Annual Food Drive

April 16, 2011 will be Hawaii Foodbank's 22nd annual food drive. Did you know that the Hawaii Foodbank is the only organization that receives, stores and gives perishable and non-perishable food items to all over the state of Hawaii. On Oahu alone, there are 250 agencies that provide food to the hungry.

These charitable agencies feed low income families and also provide homeless shelters, abuse shelters and many other programs. Not only do they provide for the everyday hungry, they are also recognized statewide as a disaster response organization. When hurricane Iniki hit Kauai in 1992, the Hawaii Foodbank rushed over 1.5 million pounds of food!

The Hawaii Foodbank was founded by the late John White in 1983. Along with one driver, White opened a small warehouse on Sand Island. Local companies donated two refrigerator containers, one flatbed truck and a three-ton forklift. By the end of the first year, they provided 380,000 pounds of food. Today, they distribute over 11.3 million pounds of food and is a certified member of Feeding America, the national food bank network.

Cool Easter Egg

- Eggs (Hard boiled or raw)
- Food Coloring
- Vinegar
- Cooking Oil
- Containers for the dye mixture
- Paper Towels
- Spoons



1. Combine in each container 1 Tablespoon of each: oil, vinegar and choice of color.
2. Add enough water to make liquid deep enough to cover an egg.
3. Swirl with spoon & quickly lower & rise an egg into it.
4. Pat dry with paper towel and repeat with 2nd color.
5. You may also repeat with a 3rd color if desired.
6. Gently pat dry the completed egg, leaving some of the oil to give the egg a shiny look!
